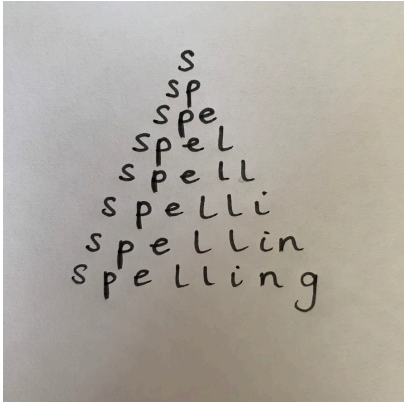

<p><b><u>Mental maths – Countdown</u></b> Set out 4 large number cards face down – 25,50,75,100. Set out 2 sets of number cards 1-10 (20 cards in total) Choose 1 card from the large numbers and 5 cards from the small numbers. Choose a target number by picking 3 more cards from the small number pile For example <math>2,7,4 = 274</math> Now, using the original 6 numbers that you picked, can you make your target number? You can use addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. You don't have to use all the numbers.</p>	<p><b><u>Write a non-chronological report about the history of the NHS</u></b> What research can you do to find out about the history of our National Health Service? Some questions and subheadings you could consider:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- What is the NHS?</li> <li>- When was the NHS initiated?</li> <li>- Why was the NHS initiated?</li> <li>- Who is part of the NHS?</li> </ul> <p>Can you talk to any family members and use their experience of the NHS? Comet Thatcher orbits the sun once every 415 years. The comet ejects dust – this is the meteors. The best time to see them will be <b>Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> and Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup></b> April. You might be able to see up to 15 shooting stars an hour. While you are watching, have a look at the moon. What do you notice? Does it change each night or stay the same? Do some research on the phases of the moon – can write an explanation with pictures of what happens?</p>
<p><b><u>Mental maths – 24</u></b> Get a pack of cards and choose 4 random cards. (If you don't have cards, just write down numbers 2-10 four times) The challenge is to try to make the number 24 out of the 4 cards. You can use any operation. <b>Remember BODMAS</b> – Brackets, division, multiplication, addition, subtraction. The person who gets closest to the total wins.</p>	<p><b><u>Spelling games</u></b> When you are not practising your spellings on Spelling Shed <a href="https://www.spellingshed.com/en-gb">https://www.spellingshed.com/en-gb</a> Have a look at some of the pictures attached for some inspiration. Can you think of some even more creative ways to practise your spellings? Please send your pictures if you do!</p>	<p><b><u>Create a doodle calendar</u></b> At the end of each day, write the date and draw a quick doodle to represent something that has happened that day. Aim for doodles to be different every day. Can you keep it up for a month? The end results look amazing if you do!</p>
		<p><b><u>Make a board game</u></b> Research existing games – what are your favourites? Think of a name for your game and a theme. <b>Things to consider</b> – What resources will you need to play the game? How will you know who has won? How will players move around the game? <b>Write instructions</b> explaining how to play the game. <b>Evaluate it</b> with your family – what worked? What needs to be changed? Take a picture for us.</p>

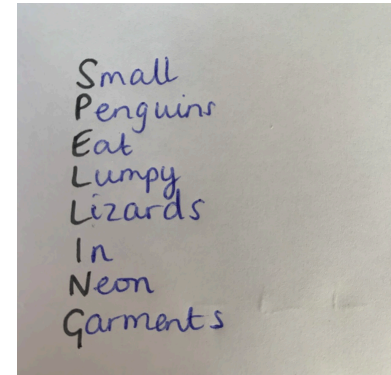

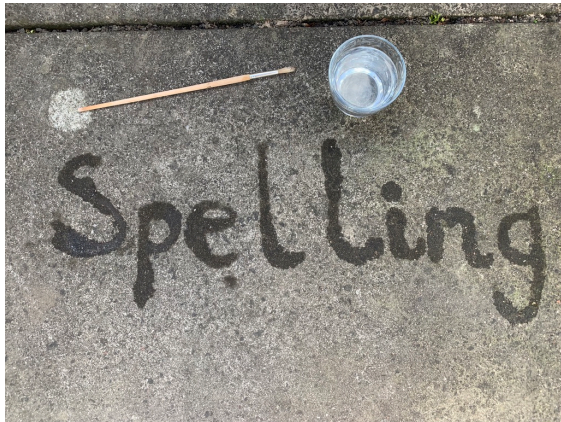
Spelling pyramids



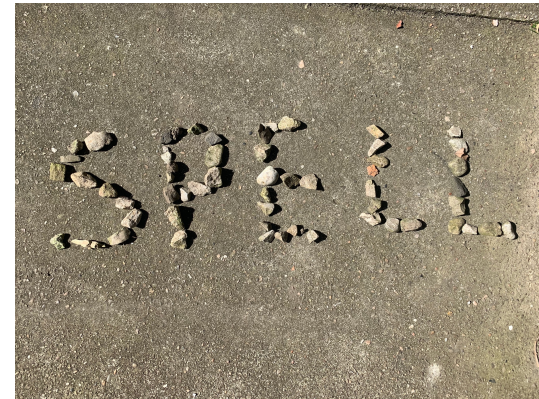
Draw into
